

Barbara Köpke

Barbara Köpke holds the position of Professor in the Language Sciences Department of the University of Toulouse 2. She directs the Interdisciplinary Research Unit Octogone-Lordat (EA 4156) and she is the coordinator of the Master in Language Sciences “Linguistics, Cognition, Communication”. Her research focuses on neuro- and psycholinguistic aspects of language processing in bilingual individuals. Her research gives special attention to extreme bilingual situations such as L1 attrition, simultaneous interpreting, and acquired language disorders. Her research focuses on the role of executive functions in the control of languages in multilingual individuals given that alternately using multiple languages involves specific demands on language control mechanisms. These are presently one of the main issues of cognitive research on bilingualism and multilingualism. Her research also touches on language disorders as multilingualism is still insufficiently taken into account in many aphasic patients, so that assessment tools for language disorders in multilingual patients can be improved.
